The Countryside and Community Research Institute (CCRI)

The Countryside and Community Research Institute (CCRI) is the largest specialist rural research centre in the UK, having multi-disciplinary expertise in all aspects of research in policy and planning for rural areas, the environment and food studies in the UK, Europe and further afield. The CCRI SUFISA team comprises lead researchers: Dr Damian Maye, Reader in Agri-Food studies; Dr James Kirwan, Reader in Food Studies and Society; and Dr Mauro Vigani, Applied Economist. Dilshaad Bundhoo, part-time PhD student, is assisting on the project.



Agricultural University of Athens, Greece

The Greek team actively involves four staff members of the Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Development of the Agricultural University of Athens (AUA). The team leader is Dr George Vlahos who is assistant professor in the Dept. He works on issues on rural and agri-environmental policies. Associate Professor Stavros Zografakis and Professor Konstantinos Tsiboukas are members of the SUFISA team. Emi Tsakalouis, senior researcher, is an agronomist (M.Sc) and was already involved in previous EU projects.



Jagiellonian University, Poland

Piotr Nowak, the author of 35 articles and two monographs on farming, rural development and life-styles of rural inhabitants. His most recent research has been focused on changes in CAP and rural development. Krzysztof Gorlach, the author of six monographs covering the issues of changes in family farming in Poland after World War II as well as rural development issues. Anna Jastrzębiec-Witowska, her field of interest covers the issues of civic agriculture as well as GMO, bio-tech. and ethical issues connected to EU rural policies.



University of Bologna, Italy

The team involved in SUFISA project is composed by Davide Viaggi (Associate Professor in Agricultural Economics & Rural Appraisal at the Department of Agricultural Sciences) Meri Raggi (Researcher in Statistics at the Department of Statistical Sciences) and Francesca Minarelli (research fellow in Agriculture Economics at the Department of Agricultural Sciences). The group has a strong experience in modelling the effects of context scenarios on agriculture and food systems as well as in modelling of asymmetric information issues applied to agri-food chains and policy.



Katholieke Universiteit Leuven, Belgium

The KU Leuven SUFISA team consists of three colleagues at the division of Bioeconomics, which is part of the department of Earth and Environmental Sciences. Prof. Erik Mathijs is coordinating the team, and is also responsible for the overall coordination of SUFISA. His research focuses on innovation processes and more particularly on how to enable the transition towards a more sustainable agricultural and food system. Dr. Tessa Avermaete is responsible for the overall project management of SUFISA and will work with the HNEE team on dissemination of the project. Dr. Isabelle Bonjean joined the team in January.





University of Pisa, Italy

The Department of Agriculture, Food and Environmental (DAFE) of the University of Pisa is active in several research areas such as agricultural and environmental economics, rural sociology, agricultural science, botany and plant protection, genetics, food science, rural engineering and livestock science. In particular, the Agricultural Economics group of the DAFE applies interdisciplinary approaches to the analysis of sustainable rural development, opening agricultural economics to social studies.



Aarhus University, Denmark

The Danish team consists of Associated Professor Egon Bjørnshave Noe and Martin Hvarregaard Thorsøe, both of the Department of Agroecology, Aarhus University. The teams' major research interests are: Farm management and decision-making processes; development and evaluation of tools to enroll local actors in decision-making concerning environmental problems, landscape management and marketing as well as the transitions processes from conventional practices to organic practices.

The Environmental Economics research team at UHasselt will focus on market power analysis.
